

MISSION/OUTREACH

What are you doing for Spring Break??? If you are not a teacher, student, college professor or college student, your answer is probably WORKING!!! So why am I asking? Well, as most of you may or may not know there are still quite a lot of Hurricane Harvey survivors in need of assistance with rebuilding their homes. You may be asking yourself...What does that have to do with me? Well we are hoping to partner with the 4B Disaster Response Network & the folks from Eight Days Of Hope. They are planning to rebuild about 750+ homes from March 10-24th. Why are we partnering with Eight Days of Hope & 4B? They will be bringing in skilled carpenters, electricians, and over 3000 volunteers from all over the country to conduct rebuilding efforts over the next 1-2 years. The 2 weeks in March will be the initial blitz. The Texas 4B Disaster Response Network is a non-profit organization of churches that serves the area between the Beltway and Galveston Beach and Galveston Bay to Brazoria County. Partnering with them affords us a huge opportunity to help in the recovery efforts. Please consider volunteering to help. They ask for a minimum of 3 days commitment and you can work as many days as you want. You don't have to pay for anything just have reliable transportation to get yourself to the assigned work sites. I am hoping to get a group from St. John's together to work on a local site possibly in Dickinson. Please contact me in the church office if you are interested in working on this project.

I'm also excited to announce that we are also kicking off "The Blanket Project." The Blanket Project will help provide blankets to our Mexico mission project that we are also gearing up for at the end of the year. The goal this year is to provide 100 blankets from St. John's. Here's how you can help...We are looking for individuals, families, Small groups, or Sunday School classes to commit to providing blankets each week. (There are exactly 42 Sunday's left in 2018...If we collect just 3 blankets each Sunday we will have 126 blankets to take to Mexico!!!) Isn't that AWESOME??? So if you are looking for a mission...all interested in volunteering their time and resources are encouraged to help gather blankets and we would love for as many as are able to come with us to Mexico to hand them out! I will be returning to Mexico and want to bring a team and supplies from St. John's. This past December we were able to sponsor sending 60 blankets to bless the mission trip to the Albergue, El Elohe children's shelter in Galeana, Nuevo Leon, Mexico. The team handed out over 300! Please join us in helping the "least of these." Blankets can be dropped off in the Mission Donation area near the front office. UFA/Susan's Market:


Items are needed for the food bank ran by UFA.

Pancake Supper Fundraiser Update:

Thank you, thank you, thank you for supporting our kids at the pancake fundraiser!!! We raised \$989!!! We had 24 kids/youth work at the fundraiser so each kid was able to add about \$41 to their account for SUMMIT, UM Army, and/or camp at Lakeview! You guys are so awesome! Thank you all so very much!!! This helps cover the cost of Camp (\$400), SUMMIT (\$100) and UM Army (\$275) per kid.
